Standard setting: a closer look to the rights of children living in institutions



Recommendation Rec (2005) of the Committee of Ministers to member States on the rights of children living in institutions







Two main Principles:

- Decisions should always be taken in the best interests of the individual child
- The dignity and the Child rights should be always protected and promoted







Basic principles

The **family** is the natural environment: parents have the primary responsibility for the upbringing and development of children

Need to prevent separation: support families and address root-causes

Placement should remain an exception, contact with the family should be maintained if possible

The placement should be the result of a procedure with guarantees, not be longer than necessary, subject to periodic reviews, carefully monitored, and look forward to the needs and the future of the child





Basic principles

The **institution** should

- function according to clear and accessible public regulations and standards approved in due respect of children's rights
- receive the necessary support from the authorities in terms of trained staff and facilities








Specific Rights of children

- to be placed only if need be, on the basis of a multidisciplinary assessment which is periodically reviewed and for which the Child views are sought
- to maintain regular contacts the family and other significant people
- to be placed with siblings when possible
- good quality health care, education, training
- respect of dignity and physical integrity









Specific Rights of children

- to privacy, including access to a person they trust and to a competent body for confidential advice
- to be prepared for active and responsible citizenship
- to participate in decision making processes
- to be informed about children's rights and the rules of the institution in a child-friendly way
- to make complaints to an identifiable, impartial and independent body





Guidelines and Quality standards for institutions

- Close to the child's environment, in small familiy-style living units
- Individual care plan preparing for living outside
- Organisation of staff allowing for
 - •Quality and stability of living units and adequately remmunerated staff (professional and trained staff)
 - •Multidisciplinary team-work and diversified staff
- Functionnig according to a code of ethics
- Accredited, registered, monitored (by external authority)
- With procedures for effective sanctionnig of Infringements to children's rights






Reneweing commitments

Building a Europe for and with children

- Promotion of children's rights through
 - Improving Legislative frameworks and setting new standards if necessary
 - Elaborating comprehensive policies that integrate all children needs and address rootcauses of children distress
 - Reviewing and building institutional framework
 - Launching awareness campaigns, producing education material and providing training
 - Promoting networks and exchange of good practices

- Ensure children's access to information
